

## **Veteran Building Life After Recovery**



"It helps to be able to talk through things with the staff."

Emmit Groce recently received clothing from FGHC through our connection to the Center for Veterans Issues' Homeless Veterans' Reintegration Program (HVRP). After years of struggling with drug addiction, Emmit is sober and working on getting back into the labor force.

Emmit grew up on the east side of Milwaukee with his parents and four siblings. He said the family ate meals together and were a "church going" family. His father worked hard, holding jobs on a chicken farm and as a concrete finisher.

"My Dad was a functioning alcoholic," Emmit said. "But six months before I was born he stopped drinking and he never took a drink again."

Emmit enlisted in the military in 1987, becoming a seaman and traveling to Japan where he would serve for several months before receiving an honorable discharge. Upon leaving the military, Emmit held various jobs in the health care and construction fields.

More than 20 years ago, Emmit started using drugs recreationally and eventually it became a lifestyle.

"If I was sad, I got high, if I was happy I got high, if I wanted to celebrate I got high," he said, adding, "the drugs masked the pain or emotions."

Earlier this year, after finding out he has major health issues, Emmit finally had the impetus to get sober. He entered Matt Talbot Recovery Center and completed the treatment program. He has been sober for nearly four months.

He's since moved to the Martin stabilization house. He attends weekly employment meetings at the Center for Veterans Issues. He credits the supportive environment at the center with keeping him on track and focused.

"It helps to be able to talk through things with the staff," he said.

Emmit received clothing from FGHC that will aid in his job search, including a sport coat and a pair of shoes. He would like to go to school to receive a degree in funeral service. He's also interested in becoming a peer counselor.

Apart from his career aspirations, he hopes to build relationships with his son and daughter and six grandchildren.

"I've been in and out of their lives," he said.
